### CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT JANUARY 2012

# January Highlights: Great Northern Diver, White-fronted Goose, Sanderling, Caspian Gull, Kittiwake and Snow Bunting.

92 is a reasonable species count for January when, except for a few skeins of geese heading northwest, there is usually very little bird movement, Water levels have risen from 63% to 74% full this month but duck and coot numbers remain generally low except teal which can be found in good numbers along most of the shoreline. A small wintering dunlin flock is still roosting with lapwings near the Sailing Club and the numbers of larger gulls in the roost has much reduced, as is usual for this time of year.

The adult Great Northern Diver, which arrived last month, stayed all January and a White-fronted Goose was with Canada Geese on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>. A Pink-footed Goose was with Canadas from 14<sup>th</sup> and skeins of Pinkfeet over were 400 west at 1100hrs on 13<sup>th</sup> and 30 northwest at 1010hrs on 29<sup>th</sup>. Site count maximums this month included: 2 Little Grebe on 14<sup>th</sup>, 25 Great Crested Grebe on 19<sup>th</sup>, 10 Cormorant on 4<sup>th</sup>, 2 Heron on 14<sup>th</sup>, 50 Greylag Geese on 19<sup>th</sup>, 23 feral Barnacle Geese on 31<sup>st</sup>, 3 Shelduck on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>, 166 Wigeon on 4<sup>th</sup>, 13 Gadwall on 22<sup>nd</sup>, a massive 505 Teal on 22<sup>nd</sup>, 212 Mallard on 14<sup>th</sup>, 5 Pintail on 7<sup>th</sup>, 1 Red-crested Pochard on 11<sup>th</sup>, 11 Pochard on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, 160 Tufted Duck on 4<sup>th</sup>, 12 Goldeneye on 14<sup>th</sup>, 4 Goosander on 16<sup>th</sup> and 3 Moorhen and 104 Coot on 14<sup>th</sup>.

There was little Raptor activity recorded but notables were 9 Common Buzzard visible from Sheepwash Hide and spread about the sky on 8<sup>th</sup> and a pair of Peregrine from Paul Stanley Hide on 27<sup>th</sup>. A Red-legged Partridge on 21<sup>st</sup> and 17 Pheasants on 16<sup>th</sup> suggests Carsington, with feeding stations, to be a safe haven from local shoots. Waders included an Oystercatcher taking possession of Shiningford Island from 6<sup>th</sup>, 37 Golden Plover early on 1<sup>st</sup> and 600 Lapwing on 25<sup>th</sup>. A Sanderling flew into Sheepwash at dusk on 31<sup>st</sup>, an unusual appearance for January. It flew in with 2 Dunlin and landed near 21 Dunlin which had been feeding along the shoreline for a few hours. Also seen were a Snipe on 22<sup>nd</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> and 3 Redshank from 11<sup>th</sup>.

The Gull Roost held an adult Mediterranean Gull on 24<sup>th</sup>, 1000 Black-headed Gull on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 700 Common Gull on 31<sup>st</sup>, a colour ringed Lesser Black-backed Gull on 30<sup>th</sup> (ring details submitted), 160 Lesser Black-backed Gull and 10 Herring Gull on 3<sup>rd</sup>, a Caspian Gull on 5<sup>th</sup>, 3 Yellow-legged Gull on 12<sup>th</sup>, 4 Great Black-backed Gull on 1<sup>st</sup> and, following 2 days of strong winds, an adult Kittiwake on 23<sup>rd</sup>.

A Stock Dove flew over the dam on 6<sup>th</sup> and a Barn Owl was hunting over fields near our recording area on 14<sup>th</sup>. The wintering flocks of Meadow Pipit numbered 50 on Stones Island plus 20 at Sheepwash on 16<sup>th</sup> and Pied Wagtails 97 in the same areas on 10<sup>th</sup>. A Marsh Tit was noted with a mixed flock of tits passing by Paul Stanley Hide while the local Willow Tits were still present on 19<sup>th</sup> and the feeders there also attracted 2 Coal Tit and 2 Nuthatch on 2<sup>nd</sup>. A House Sparrow was collecting nest material around the Visitor Centre on 10<sup>th</sup> and 46 Tree Sparrow were also noted on 10<sup>th</sup>. The wintering Linnet flock, seen last month and early this month, was estimated at 80 on 4<sup>th</sup> and 75 on 6<sup>th</sup>. And, finally, a Snow Bunting was feeding on the ground in front of the Wildlife Centre on 8<sup>th</sup>, it then went under the feeder tables before flying over to the shore where Pied Wagtails flushed it away. This bird was seen by several observers and one took photographs. As this species is a Derbyshire rarity, a formal DOS rarity submission is required and a photograph would be most helpful. Please contact me if you have any photograph of this bird. 92 Species this month comparing well with 89 in January 2011, 86 in 2010, 86 in 2009, 85 in 2008, 89 in 2007, 89 in 2006, 95 in 2005, 91 in 2004, 87 in 2003 and 75 in 2002.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT FEBRUARY 2012

#### February Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Whooper Swan, Sanderling and Mealy Redpoll.

A few days of moderate easterly winds at the end of January brought in some surprise waders for the start of February during an otherwise uneventful month. Water levels are now approaching normal, at 85% on 27<sup>th</sup>. The wintering adult Great Northern Diver was around all month, a Little Egret was reported at Sheepwash on 25<sup>th</sup> and a Whooper Swan at the Wildlife Centre at 1450hrs on 6<sup>th</sup>. Significant water bird counts included 40 Great Crested Grebe on 12<sup>th</sup>, 1 Pink-footed Goose on 8-14<sup>th</sup>, 322 Canada Geese on 12<sup>th</sup>, 23 Barnacle Geese on 16<sup>th</sup>, 2 Shelduck on 27<sup>th</sup>, 170 Wigeon, 37 Gadwall, 488 Teal and 249 Mallard, all on the WeBS count on 12<sup>th</sup>, 4 Pintail from 8<sup>th</sup>, 16 Pochard on 7<sup>th</sup>, 197 Tufted Duck on 12<sup>th</sup>, 14 Goldeneye on 12<sup>th</sup>, 2 Goosander on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 143 Coot on 12<sup>th</sup>. Raptor activity was limited, with 5 Common Buzzard in the air on 15<sup>th</sup> and 2 Peregrine, also on 15<sup>th</sup>, with singles around on many days.

Waders were a winter treat this month. Oystercatchers have been returning to claim their breeding islands, and they totalled 9 by 23<sup>rd</sup>. One of the Sheepwash area Oystercatchers has returned for its seventh consecutive year, it has a bar-code leg ring from the Exe Estuary Devon. A Ringed Plover was on Stones Island on 13<sup>th</sup> and on later dates and a Grey Plover was there, early morning only, on 14<sup>th</sup>. The maximum Lapwing count was 180 on 23<sup>rd</sup>. A surprising 6 Sanderling were on Stones Island on 1<sup>st</sup>, still present but scattered about the site on 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 2 remained up to 17<sup>th</sup>. With the Sanderling was a massive flock of 62 Dunlin which must be a site record, if not a Derbyshire record, for this time of year. There were still 58 to be found scattered about the site on the following day, then they rapidly reduced in numbers to 7 by 10<sup>th</sup> and to just 1, occasionally, by the end of the month. Snipe have been elusive this winter so 4 on 22<sup>nd</sup> was a welcome record and a Woodcock in Fishtail Creek on 10<sup>th</sup> was the first since December 2010. Curlew passage started with 1 on 22<sup>nd</sup>, gradually increasing, with 11 on 27<sup>th</sup> and 12 on 29<sup>th</sup>. There were 3 Redshank around site all month.

The Gull Roost held nothing unusual, with 3000 Black-headed, 250 Common and 70 Lesser Blackbacked Gulls, all on 27<sup>th</sup>, 9 Herring and 2 Yellow-legged Gulls on 15<sup>th</sup> and 4 Great Black-backed Gulls on 28<sup>th</sup>.

A Barn Owl was hunting Sheepwash car park at dusk on 10<sup>th</sup> and the local pair of Great Spotted Woodpecker at Paul Stanley Hide chased off an intruding pair on 22<sup>nd</sup>. Meadow Pipit counts were 30 on Stones Island on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>. Thrushes included a flock of 70 Fieldfare on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 6 Song Thrush and a Redwing singing on the warm morning of 17<sup>th</sup>, a flock of 35 Redwing over Shiningford on 21<sup>st</sup> and 4 Mistle Thrush around Sheepwash car park on 16<sup>th</sup>. There were possibly two flocks of Linnet, 60 at Sheepwash on 3<sup>rd</sup> and other records of 50 to 60 throughout the month in that area. Also, 30 were reported at the Wildlife Centre on 14<sup>th</sup> and many other records of 25 to 30 birds around Stones Island on 11<sup>th</sup>. This report was by pager only so the observer is not known, which is a shame as it is only the third record for the site.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT MARCH 2012

#### March Highlights: Whooper Swan, Garganey, Red Kite, Ruff and early summer migrants return.

Only 97 species this month, a month of mainly calm, warm and sometimes hot and sunny weather. Maybe migrants have been finding travel and food easy and passing straight through or passing high overhead, or, maybe some species, such as Willow Warbler, are just a few days late. The adult Great Northern Diver remained all month, usually found off Stones Island. Six Whooper Swans, looking like a family party of adult pair plus 4 first winter birds, were present briefly from 1730hrs on 24<sup>th</sup> and a pair of Garganey in Fishtail Creek was an early morning surprise on 17<sup>th</sup> and flew off north. Maximum counts this month; 8 Little Grebe on 18<sup>th</sup>, 33 Great Crested Grebe on 5<sup>th</sup>, 23 Cormorant on 8<sup>th</sup>, 3 Greylag on 27<sup>th</sup>, 108 Canada Geese on 4<sup>th</sup>, 23 Barnacle on 14<sup>th</sup>, 5 Shelduck on 29<sup>th</sup>, 148 Wigeon on 11<sup>th</sup>, 10 Gadwall on 1<sup>st</sup>, 373 Teal on 1<sup>st</sup>, 143 Mallard on 1<sup>st</sup>, 2 Pintail on 19<sup>th</sup>, 5 Shoveler on 26<sup>th</sup>, 1 Pochard on 14<sup>th</sup>, 78 Tufted Duck on 11<sup>th</sup>, 9 Goldeneye on 1<sup>st</sup>, 1 Goosander on 11<sup>th</sup>, 6 Moorhen on 16<sup>th</sup> and 108 Coot on 5<sup>th</sup>.

Two Red Kite were seen drifting south over Hall Wood at 1705hrs on 21<sup>st</sup> during a month of many Red Kite sightings in this area of Derbyshire. Eleven Common Buzzards were in the air, but distant and spread, on 19<sup>th</sup> and a Peregrine was noted on 3<sup>rd</sup> and many other dates. A Red-legged Partridge was singing from a gate perch near the Wildlife Centre on 11<sup>th</sup> and again from a picnic bench on Stones Island on 21<sup>st</sup> and 11 Pheasants were around Sheepwash car park feeders at dusk on 12<sup>th</sup>. At least 12 Oystercatchers were noted on 19<sup>th</sup> and the total is probably 7 pairs but, as they are so mobile and spread, an accurate count is impossible. The first Little Ringed Plover of the year was on Sailing Club Island on 30<sup>th</sup> only. Three Dunlin were in front of the Wildlife Centre on 10<sup>th</sup> and 4 Ruff landed at Sheepwash for 2hrs on 28<sup>th</sup> and another 2 were around Stones Island on 31<sup>st</sup>. Three Snipe were seen from the Wildlife Centre on 4<sup>th</sup>, with 1 or 2 noted on other days, and a Black-tailed Godwit, there on 25<sup>th</sup>, moved onto Sheepwash for the 26-27<sup>th</sup>. Curlew were passing through all month, with flocks of 11 on 1<sup>st</sup>, 23 on 8<sup>th</sup> and 11 on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

An adult Mediterranean Gull was in front of Sheepwash at 1000hrs and later in the roost on 7<sup>th</sup>, coincidentally the same single date as March last year. The gull roost was well spread across the whole water and counts were 2000 Black-headed Gull on 12<sup>th</sup>, 400 Common Gull on 12<sup>th</sup>, 210 Lesser Black-backed Gull on 17<sup>th</sup>, 5 Herring Gull on 15<sup>th</sup> and 4 Great Black-backed Gull on 14<sup>th</sup>. There was an adult Yellow-legged Gull on 1<sup>st</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>, but probably not the little grebe killer which has not been specifically noted since early February.

Little Owl and Tawny Owl were noted at dusk on 21<sup>st</sup>. A Green Woodpecker was heard from Millfields on 21<sup>st</sup> and 4 Great Spotted Woodpecker were drumming on 16<sup>th</sup>. The first Sand Martin was an earliest ever on site on 11<sup>th</sup>, but few hirrundines followed, with just 2 Sand Martin on 21<sup>st</sup>, 1 on 31<sup>st</sup> and 1 Swallow on 30<sup>th</sup> does not make a summer, yet. Meadow Pipit numbers on the dam early morning were best mid-month with 24 on 21<sup>st</sup> and 24 Pied Wagtail at the same time. A walk around the reservoir on 16<sup>th</sup> noted 42 Wren, 26 Dunnock, 38 Robin, 30 Blackbird, 12 Song Thrush, 32 Redwing, 6 Willow Tit, 5 Nuthatch, 14 Magpie, 22 Carrion Crow, 53 Chaffinch, 22 Goldfinch, 9 Siskin, 1 Crossbill, 10 Bullfinch and 5 Reed Bunting. The first Wheatear arrived at Millfields on 17<sup>th</sup> and there were 2 on 19<sup>th</sup> but none since. The first Blackcap singing was in Sheepwash car park on 27<sup>th</sup> and 6 were noted on 28<sup>th</sup> at various locations. Chiffchaff were first noted with 3 on 16<sup>th</sup> increasing to 19 between Millfields via Stones Island to Hopton on 23<sup>rd</sup>.

97 Species recorded this March compared with 106 in March 2010, 101 in 2010, 102 in 2009, 104 in 2008, 95 in 2007 and 100 in 2006.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT APRIL 2012

#### April Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Osprey, Little Gull, Kittiwake and Black Tern.

Summer migrants had been held back by the cold, wet and windy weather. Some warbler species, expected before the 20<sup>th</sup> finally arrived on 30<sup>th</sup>. Early breeders also suffered with Oystercatchers, Lapwings and probably Raven losing their clutches to the weather, but some wet and windy days did bring a good passage of terns and gulls for those observers who braved the conditions.

The adult Great Northern Diver stayed all month and attained full summer plumage by 25<sup>th</sup>, a similar date to last year and that bird stayed on until 18<sup>th</sup> May. A presumed escapee Sacred Ibis flew over Shiningford at 1145hrs on 10<sup>th</sup>, coincidentally a Sacred Ibis was at the Wildlife Centre on 25<sup>th</sup> last year. Another escapee, a drake Cape Shelduck, was on site on 17<sup>th</sup>. Wildfowl counts were; 41 Great Crested Grebe on 8<sup>th</sup>, 10 Mute Swan on 30<sup>th</sup>, 1 Whooper Swan on 20<sup>th</sup>, 1 Pink-footed Goose of unknown origin from 11<sup>th</sup>, 9 Greylag Geese on 8<sup>th</sup>, 88 Canadas on 8<sup>th</sup>, 22 Barnacles on 13<sup>th</sup>, 2 Shelduck on 11<sup>th</sup>, 2 Mandarin on 24<sup>th</sup>, 2 Wigeon on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1 Gadwall on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 19 Teal and 98 adult Mallard on 8<sup>th</sup>, 1 Pintail on 16<sup>th</sup>, a pair of Shoveler on 30<sup>th</sup>, 68 Tufted Duck on 8<sup>th</sup>, 3 Common Scoter on 7<sup>th</sup>, 2 Goldeneye still present on 30<sup>th</sup>, a drake Red-breasted Merganser on 3<sup>rd</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> and 72 Coot on 8<sup>th</sup>. There were 7 broods of Mallard noted by the end of the month, nearly matching last year's 8. A Red-legged Partridge was in Fishtail Creek on 5<sup>th</sup> and 12 pheasants noted on 6<sup>th</sup>.

Raptors included a pair of Sparrowhawk on 12<sup>th</sup>, a male carrying prey in Hall Wood on 13<sup>th</sup> and 11 Buzzards in the air on 8<sup>th</sup>. Ospreys were the big attraction with at least 5 different birds seen between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> and another on 26<sup>th</sup>. Two were flying around together on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> and were reported from all ends of Carsington Water. A Hobby was seen from Sheepwash Hide on 27<sup>th</sup> and Peregrine noted on 6<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>.

Wader passage was limited with water levels close to maximum leaving little suitable shore margins and breeding had mixed fortunes with the poor weather. Of the 6 (or possibly 7) pairs of breeding Oystercatchers, at least 2 pairs lost nests in the foul weather on 29<sup>th</sup> and 2 pairs were known to be OK still on 30<sup>th</sup>. A brood of Lapwing chicks were seen from the Wildlife Centre on 21<sup>st</sup>, sadly 2 were killed by Coot the next day, but the remaining 2 chicks were still active at the end of the month. Maximum counts of passage waders were 2 Dunlin on 27<sup>th</sup>, 2 Ruff 1<sup>st</sup>-10<sup>th</sup>, 6 Black-tailed Godwit on 12<sup>th</sup>, 1 Bar-tailed Godwit on 28<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>, 4 Whimbrel on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 6 Curlew on 27<sup>th</sup> and 3 Common Sandpiper on 27<sup>th</sup>.

Gull numbers included 13 Little Gull through on the wet and windy 25<sup>th</sup>, 216 Black-headed at the Wildlife Centre on 9<sup>th</sup>, 90 Common Gull at Sheepwash on 11<sup>th</sup> and 2 Kittiwake through on the wet and windy 29<sup>th</sup>. Tern passage maximums were 2 Common on 25<sup>th</sup>, 29 Arctic on 18<sup>th</sup>, 130 Arctic on 25<sup>th</sup> and 2 Black Tern on 25<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>.

Many good counts of passerines, including migrant first dates, were reported this month. Briefly, 1 Swift on 24<sup>th</sup> and 50plus on 30<sup>th</sup>, 1 Green Woodpecker on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 100plus Sand Martin on 18<sup>th</sup>, 1 Swallow on 5<sup>th</sup> and 500 on 25<sup>th</sup>, 2 House Martin on 9<sup>th</sup>, 9 Yellow Wagtail on 18<sup>th</sup>, 5 White Wagtail on 11<sup>th</sup>, 43 Wren on 6<sup>th</sup>, female Redstart on 15<sup>th</sup>, 49 Blackbird on 6<sup>th</sup>, 200 Fieldfare on 18<sup>th</sup>, first Garden Warbler on 23<sup>rd</sup>, first Sedge Warbler, Lesser and Whitethroat all on 30<sup>th</sup>, 34 Blackcap and 64 Chiffchaff on 15<sup>th</sup>, a Pied Flycatcher on 22<sup>nd</sup>, a site rare Marsh Tit on 24<sup>th</sup>, a Magpie took a bat in mid-air on 20<sup>th</sup> and 28 Bullfinch on 15<sup>th</sup>.

114 Species were recorded compared with 111 in April 2011, 116 in 2010, 110 in 2009 and 118 in 2008.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT MAY 2012

#### May Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Red Kite, Osprey, Sandwich Tern, Black Tern and Cuckoo.

April was an exceptionally wet and cold month and May continued the same until a hot calm spell started on 21<sup>st</sup>. Hopefully, this suitable breeding weather came soon enough to save some of the early broods, especially tits, who usually only have one brood. Many other species commonly have subsequent broods and these may be more successful this year. The wintering adult Great Northern Diver in splendid summer plumage departed early on 4<sup>th</sup>. Fresh broods of Wildfowl were few, with 2 Barnacle Goose broods, 1 Mallard and 1 Coot brood. Notable counts were 38 Great Crested Grebe on 21<sup>st</sup>, 2 Greylag on 10<sup>th</sup>, 3 Shelduck on 5<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup>, a drake Mandarin on 6<sup>th</sup>, 3 drake Wigeon on 5<sup>th</sup>, 3 Teal on 31<sup>st</sup>, 72 Mallard on 21<sup>st</sup>, a drake Pochard on 18<sup>th</sup>, 85 Tufted Duck on 21<sup>st</sup>, a pair of Common Scoter on 17<sup>th</sup>, the latest ever spring Goldeneye on 6<sup>th</sup> and 41 Coot on 21<sup>st</sup>.

Raptors included a Red Kite low over Sailing Club on 9<sup>th</sup> and Ospreys on 8<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>. The bird on 18<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup> roosted on Lane Ends Osprey platform. Sparrow Hawk was seen carrying prey on 3<sup>rd</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> and 5 Buzzards were in the air on 8<sup>th</sup>. A Hobby was noted on 12<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> and a Peregrine on 8<sup>th</sup>.

Wader breeding so far is 2 broods each from Oystercatcher, Lapwing and Redshank, but survival rates look poor at the Wildlife Centre. A reasonable selection of passage waders included 3 Little Ringed Plover on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1 Ringed Plover from 8<sup>th</sup>, 2 Sanderling on 19<sup>th</sup>, 6 Dunlin on 19<sup>th</sup>, 2 Bar-tailed Godwit on 4-7<sup>th</sup>, 12 Whimbrel on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 4 Curlew on 16<sup>th</sup>, 6 Common Sandpiper on 5<sup>th</sup> and 5 Turnstone on 19<sup>th</sup>.

The Black-headed Gull colony at the Wildlife Centre had 8 nests on the raft and 16 on Horseshoe Island on 1<sup>st</sup>, but 12 nests were lost on Horseshoe Island on 23<sup>rd</sup> together with Oystercatcher, Grebe and Coot nests. A first summer Mediterranean Gull was in Shiningford Creek late on 15<sup>th</sup>, 40 Common Gulls present on 3<sup>rd</sup>, a first summer Yellow-legged Gull on 16<sup>th</sup> and an adult Kittiwake flew through early on 19<sup>th</sup>. Tern passage included a Sandwich Tern on 12<sup>th</sup> and 3 Common Tern on 19<sup>th</sup>. Arctic Tern went through most days up to 15<sup>th</sup> with notable counts of 23 on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 55 on 4<sup>th</sup>, 31 on 5<sup>th</sup> and 10 on 12<sup>th</sup>. A Black Tern left with Arctic Terns early on 3<sup>rd</sup> and another arrived later at 1300hrs and stayed until dawn on 4<sup>th</sup>.

A site rare Cuckoo was clearly heard by many observers in Sheepwash Hide on 6<sup>th</sup>, soon followed by an even rarer sight of an otter, but mink could not be eliminated. Another sighting on 6<sup>th</sup> was an unseasonal Kingfisher at Millfields, probably displaced by high river levels and/or failed breeding. A Green Woodpecker was in Tail Bay on 16<sup>th</sup> with 2 there on 21<sup>st</sup> and 6 Great Spotted Woodpecker were noted on 16<sup>th</sup>. Yellow Wagtails were present up to 20<sup>th</sup> with a maximum of 5 on 6<sup>th</sup> and 1 White Wagtail on 8<sup>th</sup>. A Pied Flycatcher was singing at Shiningford on 16<sup>th</sup> and another site rare Marsh Tit was seen and heard on 5<sup>th</sup>. There were many big counts of common passerines this month, mainly from circular walks, a selection are: 135 Swift and 215 Swallow on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 85 House Martin on 5<sup>th</sup>, 66 Wren, 21 Dunnock, 59 Robin and 73 Blackbird on 16<sup>th</sup>, 150 Fieldfare on 5<sup>th</sup>, 3 Reed Warbler on 21<sup>st</sup>, 3 Lesser and 11 Whitethroat on 16<sup>th</sup>, 75 Blackcap, 70 Chiffchaff and 39 Willow Warbler on 16<sup>th</sup>, 4 Spotted Flycatcher on 22<sup>nd</sup>, 14 Rook on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 65 Chaffinch on 16<sup>th</sup>, 8 Linnet on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 10 Lesser Redpoll on 5<sup>th</sup> and 16 Bullfinch on 16<sup>th</sup>.

A big 116 Species this month compared with 111 in May 2011, 106 in 2010, 108 in 2009, 112 in 2008 and bettered only in May 1996 with 119 species.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT JUNE 2012

#### June Highlights: Osprey, Black Tern and 6 singing Reed Warblers.

The wet and cold of April and May continued through June, affecting the whole breeding season. However, the number of broods recorded suggests breeding season has not been such a damp failure as feared. Ground and water feeding birds seem to have had a reasonable season, arboreal insect feeders such as tit families in trees seem to be showing smaller family size, but aerial insect feeders must have been struggling at times and the House Martin flock at the Visitor Centre was well into their usual breeding season before they finally settled to nest.

Water bird breeding found: 5 pairs of Great Crested Grebe with broods this month, Mute Swan pair with 4 cygnets, 5 broods of Mallard, taking this season's total to 13, 2 broods of Moorhen and 3 of Coot. Notable counts were from the WeBS count on 23<sup>rd</sup> except where stated otherwise: 25 Great Crested Grebe (excluding chicks/young), 13 Mute Swan, 347 Canada Geese on 26<sup>th</sup>, a drake Wigeon from 4<sup>th</sup>, 42 Mallard, a drake Pochard on 10<sup>th</sup>, 67 Tufted Duck and 97 Coot.

Raptors included a Red Kite over Hopton village on 14<sup>th</sup>, yet more Osprey records with 1 on 12<sup>th</sup> and another on 25<sup>th</sup> and a Peregrine on 9<sup>th</sup>.

Wader breeding so far this year is: 3 Oystercatcher broods of 2 young each successfully fledging, 3 broods each of Lapwing and Redshank, which is a little down, and fledging success may well be very low. Other waders recorded include 2 Dunlin on 14<sup>th</sup>, 3 Black-tailed Godwit on 28<sup>th</sup> and a Curlew on 5<sup>th</sup> and other dates.

Black-headed Gull pairs at the Wildlife Centre showed at least 9 young on the tern raft plus 1 on Horseshoe Island. Another pair had 1 chick on the raft at Paul Stanley Hide on 17<sup>th</sup> and a further nest was on Sailing Club Island. There are no breeding Common Tern this year but a pair were looking at the Wildlife Centre raft on 20<sup>th</sup> and 15 adult Common Tern were resting from heavy rain on Watersports raft early on 24<sup>th</sup>. A Black Tern was around early on 4<sup>th</sup> and was last seen midmorning feeding off Lane End.

Swifts were still passing through all month with 30 on 4<sup>th</sup> and 50 on 12<sup>th</sup>. A Green Woodpecker was at Millfields on 12<sup>th</sup> and 7 Great Spotted Woodpecker were noted on site on 27<sup>th</sup>. There were 70 Swallows off Sheepwash on 4<sup>th</sup>, a pair breeding in the Stone Barn on 8<sup>th</sup> and 12 of the House Martin nests around the Visitor Centre seemed active by 20<sup>th</sup>. At least 2 young families of Pied Wagtails were being fed on 5<sup>th</sup>, 4 locations of young Robin noted during the month and male Redstarts were still present in Wildlife Centre Creek on 17<sup>th</sup> and Warrington Knob on 18<sup>th</sup>. Singing Reed Warblers totalled 6 on 12<sup>th</sup> with regularly 3 in Hopton Arm Reedbed, 2 at the Wildlife Centre Creek on 15<sup>th</sup> with singles there on other dates and another in Hall Wood on 18<sup>th</sup>. Separate families of tits noted throughout the month included 1 Long-tailed, 2 Willow, 7 Blue and 4 Great. Other fledged families noted were 2 Nuthatch, 1 Jay, 1 Magpie, 2 Carrion Crow and 2 Bullfinch. Several House and Tree Sparrows were still feeding young in nests. Also of note this month was a Meadow Pipit on 10<sup>th</sup>, 2 Siskin in Tail Bay on 14<sup>th</sup> and a Linnet in Fishtail Creek on 18<sup>th</sup>.

88 Species this month compared with 95 in June 2011, 88 in 2010, 93 in 2009, 91 in 2008, 93 in 2007 and 89 in 2006.

## **CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT JULY 2012**

At last some sun, heat and calm during the month, resulting in many water birds bringing out new broods, totalling by the end of July: Little Grebe 1 (1 last year), Great Crested Grebe, a new site record of 14 (3), Mallard 17 (20), Tufted Duck 11 (4), Moorhen 3 (3) and Coot 12 (3). Maximum counts, excluding young, were logged on the WeBS count of 23<sup>rd</sup> unless dated: 5 Little Grebe, 32 Great Crested Grebe, 24 Cormorant on 27<sup>th</sup>, 5 Heron on 24<sup>th</sup>, 26 Mute Swan on 26<sup>th</sup>, 5 Greylag Geese on 3<sup>rd</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, 336 Canada Geese on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 11 Barnacle Geese on 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>, 3 Gadwall on 12<sup>th</sup>, 4 Teal on 5<sup>th</sup>, 133 Mallard, 1 Pochard on 7-11<sup>th</sup>, 116 Tufted Duck, 11 Common Scoter on 9<sup>th</sup> then 13 on 15<sup>th</sup> and 24 on 20<sup>th</sup> and 127 Coot.

Raptors included a male Sparrow Hawk inside the Wildlife Centre. This is the third occasion a male has had to be released from here in the past 2 years and is probably due to the hawk chasing tree sparrows and the sparrows having a crafty escape around the Wildlife Centre open door and screen. Osprey sightings this month were: 1 on a pole with a fish near Fishtail Creek on 1<sup>st</sup>, carrying a fish west over the Wildlife Centre on 12<sup>th</sup>, flying by the restaurant balcony at lunchtime, mobbed by 5 crows, then southwest over the dam on 18<sup>th</sup>, over the Visitor Centre on 24<sup>th</sup> and over the dam wall on 25<sup>th</sup>. A Hobby was noted on 22<sup>nd</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> and Peregrine on 17<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup>.

Oystercatcher have been moving away following breeding, with 10 at Sheepwash on 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> when 4 landed on Sheepwash Hide roof, 7 were noisily flying around together on 20<sup>th</sup> and only 3 were still on site on 24<sup>th</sup>. Other waders included: an adult and a well flighted juvenile Little Ringed Plover on 12<sup>th</sup>, 28 Lapwing on 23<sup>rd</sup>, a Dunlin on 13<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, 9 Black-tailed Godwit on 27<sup>th</sup>, 6 Curlew on 7<sup>th</sup>, 1 Redshank on most days, a Greenshank on 20<sup>th</sup>, 8 Common Sandpiper on 29<sup>th</sup> and a Turnstone on 20<sup>th</sup>.

The juvenile Black-headed Gulls moved from the Wildlife Centre onto Sailing Club Island. Gull numbers were: 42 Black-headed Gull on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2 Common Gull on 24<sup>th</sup> and a juvenile on 27<sup>th</sup>, 200 Lesser Black-backed Gull on 5<sup>th</sup>, a Herring Gull on 27<sup>th</sup> and an adult Yellow-legged Gull appeared from 3<sup>rd</sup>, the same date as last year. There were 6 Common Terns, including 1 juvenile, from 19<sup>th</sup> and a maximum of 9 on 22<sup>nd</sup> and an Arctic Tern was with the Commons on 19<sup>th</sup>.

Site surprises were a juvenile Cuckoo on 21<sup>st</sup>, a Kingfisher chased by 2 food carrying Spotted Flycatcher on 11<sup>th</sup> and an adult and a juvenile Green Woodpecker together at Millfields on 26<sup>th</sup>. Three pairs of Swallow were feeding young at separate nest sites around Millfields on 4<sup>th</sup> but the House Martin colony at the Visitor Centre has much less breeding activity than usual. Early southwards passage was noted with 2 Meadow Pipit on 18<sup>th</sup> and a Yellow Wagtail on 24<sup>th</sup>. Apart from the common breeding birds at Carsington, breeding was also proven for Redstart, Reed Warbler, Goldcrest and Spotted Flycatcher. Another surprise is a (very early autumn!) flock of Starlings roosting on Stones Island, with 300 there on 24<sup>th</sup> and 350 on 27<sup>th</sup>. 96 Species were recorded this July compared with the biggest ever July record of 105 in 2011, 91 in 2010, 95 in 2009, 97 in 2008, 94 in 2007, 94 in 2006 and 97 in 2005.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT SEPTEMBER 2012

#### September Highlights: Great White Egret, Red Kite, Marsh Harrier, Osprey and Arctic Skua.

Some really good birds this month but you had to be on site to catch a sight of most. The Great White Egret on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> did give a chance for some observers to catch up, being mobile around Sheepwash and Paul Stanley Hide areas from 0850 to 1010hrs. It is only the sixteenth Derbyshire record and the one previous record at Carsington in December 2008 was seen by a lone observer. Very few winter wildfowl have returned so far, the maximum counts were (for WeBS on 16<sup>th</sup> unless dated otherwise): 19 Little Grebe, 35 Great Crested Grebe, 50 Cormorant, 1 Little Egret on several dates from 2<sup>nd</sup>, 10 Heron on 4<sup>th</sup>, 28 Mute Swan on 4<sup>th</sup>, 200 Pink-footed Geese west on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 17 Greylag on 21<sup>st</sup>, 348 Canada Geese on 21<sup>st</sup>, 14 Barnacle and a Ruddy Shelduck (escapee?) together on 14<sup>th</sup>, 71 Wigeon on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 11 Gadwall on 21<sup>st</sup>, 66 Teal on 18<sup>th</sup>, 207 Mallard, 6 Pintail on 22<sup>nd</sup>, 7 Shoveler on 10<sup>th</sup>, 1 Red-crested Pochard on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 15 Pochard on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 120 Tufted Duck, 4 Common Scoter on 25<sup>th</sup>, 3 Goosander and 606 Coot.

Raptors included a Red Kite over Stones Island on 7<sup>th</sup>, a juvenile Marsh Harrier southwest past Fishtail Creek on 1<sup>st</sup>, an Osprey seen heading north on 8<sup>th</sup>, a Hobby on 11<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> and a Peregrine on 12<sup>th</sup>.

Wader passage has been poor in Derbyshire, with just 9 species here at Carsington compared with 19 in September last year, but 2011 was an exceptional year. The maximum wader counts were: 2 Ringed Plover on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 5 Golden Plover over on 18<sup>th</sup>, 75 Lapwing on 7<sup>th</sup>, 1 Little Stint on 24-25<sup>th</sup>, 1 Dunlin on 19<sup>th</sup> and 24-25<sup>th</sup>, 4 Snipe on 9<sup>th</sup>, 1 Redshank on 12<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>, 3 Common Sandpiper on 16<sup>th</sup> and 1 Turnstone on 9<sup>th</sup>.

A disturbance to the gull roost on 21<sup>st</sup> eventually revealed 4 adult dark morph Arctic Skuas flying around for a few minutes and then leaving together northwest. The gull roost held 225 Black-headed Gulls on 10<sup>th</sup>, 5 Common Gulls on 24<sup>th</sup> and 4000 Lesser Black-backed and 5 Yellow-legged Gulls on 7<sup>th</sup>. There was at least 1 juvenile Common Tern and a juvenile Arctic Tern still around on 24<sup>th</sup>.

The last Swift went past the Wildlife Centre on 9<sup>th</sup>, a Kingfisher was seen most days anywhere between Millfields and Brown Ale Bay, a Green Woodpecker was calling at Millfields on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 290 Swallows went through in 1 hour on 18<sup>th</sup>, 230 House Martin were present on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 30 Meadow Pipit on the dam on 17<sup>th</sup>, a Yellow Wagtail on 16<sup>th</sup>, 117 Pied Wagtail on the dam early on 17<sup>th</sup>, a male Redstart was in the Wildlife Centre Creek on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2 Wheatear on the dam on 8<sup>th</sup>, 17 Blackbird on rowan on 6<sup>th</sup>, 17 Chiffchaff on Stones Island on 17<sup>th</sup>, a Spotted Flycatcher in Warrington Knob on 6<sup>th</sup> and 11 Willow Tit noted on 6<sup>th</sup>. The partly tame Rook was at either the Wildlife Centre or Visitor Centre all month. The Starling roost on Stones Island held 300 birds on 4<sup>th</sup> but there was no sign of a roost later in the month.

105 Species were recorded this September compared with 124 in 2011, 117 in 2010, 103 in 2009, 108 in 2008, 108 in 2007, 101 in 2006, 101 in 2005, 94 in 2004 and 104 in 2003.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT OCTOBER 2012

#### October Highlights: Slavonian Grebe, Whooper Swan, Merlin, Grey Phalarope and Caspian Gull.

A few good species stopped-off on their autumn migration southwards and wintering bird numbers increased, except for some duck species such as wigeon and tufted, whose numbers were well below those expected by the end of October. Maximum counts of waterbirds were 21 Little Grebe on 12<sup>th</sup>, 70 Great Crested Grebe on 15<sup>th</sup> and a Slavonian Grebe on 27<sup>th</sup> stayed around Stones Island all day but proved elusive for observers. There were 39 Cormorant on 13<sup>th</sup>, 1 Little Egret on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 5 Heron on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 32 Mute Swan on 13<sup>th</sup>. Winter swan passage was 4 adult Whooper Swan on 26<sup>th</sup> and a pair with 1 juvenile on 28<sup>th</sup>. Pink-footed Goose passage was noted, with 350 west on 10<sup>th</sup>, 65 west on 14<sup>th</sup>, 80 northwest on 21<sup>st</sup> and 600 southeast in 14 flocks on 27<sup>th</sup>. There were 41 Greylag Geese on 8<sup>th</sup> and 25 feral Barnacle Geese on 1<sup>st</sup>. Maximum Duck counts were 4 Shelduck on 28<sup>th</sup>, 1 drake Mandarin on 26<sup>th</sup>, 125 (335 last year) Wigeon on 12<sup>th</sup>, 11 (32) Gadwall on 17<sup>th</sup>, 213 (282) Teal on 29<sup>th</sup>, 139 (141) Mallard on 13<sup>th</sup>, 5 Pintail on 12<sup>th</sup>, 3 Shoveler on 5<sup>th</sup>, 204 Pochard on 29<sup>th</sup>, 136 (335) Tufted Duck on 13<sup>th</sup>, 4 Scaup on 12<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup>, 11 Common Scoter on 12<sup>th</sup>, 9 Goldeneye on 26<sup>th</sup>, 2 Red-breasted Merganser on 19<sup>th</sup>, 10 Goosander on 19<sup>th</sup> and 631 (1016) Coot on the formal WeBS count on 13<sup>th</sup>.

Raptors included 2 Sparrowhawk on 8<sup>th</sup>, 11 Common Buzzard seen in the air from Sheepwash Hide on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2 Kestrel on 5<sup>th</sup>, a male Merlin below the dam wall on 16<sup>th</sup> and a Peregrine on 1<sup>st</sup>. Some good wader species this month with 1 Oystercatcher on 13<sup>th</sup> and other dates, 26 Golden Plover over Stones Island on 8<sup>th</sup>, 1 Grey Plover in flight on 12<sup>th</sup>, a maximum 112 Lapwing on 21<sup>st</sup>, 7 Dunlin on 12<sup>th</sup>, 4 Snipe on 31<sup>st</sup>, a Bar-tailed Godwit at Sheepwash on 28<sup>th</sup>, a Curlew on 25<sup>th</sup>, the last Common Sandpiper of the year on 13<sup>th</sup> and a Grey Phalarope from 17<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup>. This is the fifth Grey Phalarope at Carsington, the last one being in September 2008. The bird was found at Sheepwash and was then mobile between Brown Ale Bay and Lanes End and proved elusive at times during its 4 day stay.

A first winter Little Gull flew towards the dam from Sheepwash on 6<sup>th</sup> and the Gull Roost held 2000 Black-headed Gull on 8<sup>th</sup>, 220 Common Gull on 29<sup>th</sup>, 5000 Lesser Black-backed on 8<sup>th</sup>, 6 Herring Gull on 15<sup>th</sup>, a Caspian Gull on 15<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> and 4 Yellow-legged Gull on 15<sup>th</sup>.

Autumn movement pushed 180 Woodpigeon in 5 flocks through westwards on 28<sup>th</sup>. There were 12 Collared Dove around the Ranger Base on 23<sup>rd</sup> and a Barn Owl was hunting along Hopton Arm at dusk on 26<sup>th</sup>. Kingfisher has been seen almost daily at all points between Paul Stanley Hide and Millfields. Skylark were moving southwards, with 9 flying over on 29<sup>th</sup> and the last 7 Swallow went through on 8<sup>th</sup>. Meadow Pipit numbered 30 on 5<sup>th</sup> and a Rock Pipit flew over on 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> and 1 was finally found on the dam on 19<sup>th</sup>. For some years Pied Wagtails have roosted in the dam wall rip-rap in summer and autumn but, on 1<sup>st</sup>, 87 were counted on the Visitor Centre roof at dusk and they then went on to roost in nearby bushes. Dawn walks along the dam wall confirmed that the Pied Wagtails were no longer roosting in there. The last Wheatear was on 18<sup>th</sup> and winter thrushes passing through were 220 Fieldfare on 26<sup>th</sup> and 3 Redwing on 5<sup>th</sup> and 100 on 25<sup>th</sup>. A Blackcap was still around on 10<sup>th</sup> and 7 Chiffchaff, also on 10<sup>th</sup>, were the last of the month. Corvids were active, with 7 Jays in flight together on 13<sup>th</sup>, 200 Jackdaws passing in half an hour on 6<sup>th</sup>, the tame Rook again around the Wildlife Centre on 28<sup>th</sup> and other days and 3 Raven on 8<sup>th</sup>. Many Starlings have been moving through, with 1700 in 14 flocks all westward on 28<sup>th</sup>. Other birds coming in were a Brambling on 19<sup>th</sup>, 35 Siskin on 29<sup>th</sup>, 7 Linnet on 15<sup>th</sup>, 40 Lesser Redpoll on 19<sup>th</sup>, and a Yellowhammer flew over on 28<sup>th</sup>.

104 species recorded this October compared with 103 in 2011, 109 in 2010, 108 in 2009 and 94 in 2008.

## CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT NOVEMBER 2012

#### Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Slavonian Grebe, Scaup, Water Rail, Water Pipit and Waxwing.

Water levels in November last year were 50% capacity, which was blamed for reduced wildfowl numbers. This year's water level was 87%, maintained by considerable rainfall, and wildfowl numbers were much the same, but an early Great Northern Diver did arrive on 19<sup>th</sup>. Initially it was thought to be a juvenile, but closer views, some days later, showed it to be an adult retaining some of its breeding plumage pale marking on the mantle. Maybe it is last winter's bird returning! A Slavonian Grebe was seen diving in front of the Wildlife Centre on 27<sup>th</sup> and was still there early on 30<sup>th</sup>. A pair plus 2 juvenile Whooper Swan were at Sheepwash on 5<sup>th</sup>, an adult on 7<sup>th</sup> and 4 adults on 30<sup>th</sup>. Pink-footed Geese movements noted were 67 flying West on 26<sup>th</sup>, 28 SE on 27<sup>th</sup> and 230 ESE on 28<sup>th</sup>. Wildfowl maximum counts were: 53 Great Crested Grebe on 18<sup>th</sup>, 22 Cormorant on 28<sup>th</sup>, 28 Mute Swan on 18<sup>th</sup>, 1 Barnacle Goose on 7<sup>th</sup>, 113 Wigeon on 1<sup>st</sup>, 13 Gadwall on 1<sup>st</sup>, 200 Teal on 1<sup>st</sup>, 168 Mallard on 26<sup>th</sup>, 2 Pintail on 7<sup>th</sup>, 15 Shoveler on 30<sup>th</sup>, which is a site record, 1 drake Red-crested Pochard from 9<sup>th</sup> to 27<sup>th</sup>, an unusually large 271 Pochard on 1<sup>st</sup>, a very low 168 Tufted Duck on 18<sup>th</sup>, 3 Scaup on 27<sup>th</sup>, 7 Common Scoter on 7<sup>th</sup>, 9 Goldeneye on 28<sup>th</sup>, 2 Red-breasted Merganser on 29<sup>th</sup>, 14 Goosander on 24<sup>th</sup> and only 636 Coot on 18<sup>th</sup>. A Water Rail on 2<sup>nd</sup> was on the path to Paul Stanley Hide, looking ill or in a state of shock and not fleeing from passing observers, but a rescue mission a little later failed to find the bird, so, hopefully, it regained its skulking nature. It certainly has not been seen since despite extensive searching for this Carsington site rare species.

Raptor records were few, with 3 Common Buzzard seen from the Wildlife Centre on 3<sup>rd</sup> and a peregrine noted on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>. Waders were also few in numbers of species and included: 1 Oystercatcher from 6<sup>th</sup>, 280 Lapwing on 26<sup>th</sup>, 5 Dunlin on 6<sup>th</sup>, 3 Snipe on 30<sup>th</sup>, a surprising 5 Woodcock flushed during a short woodland survey in Hall Wood on 19<sup>th</sup>, a Bar-tailed Godwit on Watersports Island on 6<sup>th</sup> and 2 Redshank from 3<sup>rd</sup>.

The Gull Roost maximum counts were at least 4000 Black-headed Gull on 29<sup>th</sup>, 600 Common Gull on 29<sup>th</sup>, 4000 Lesser Black-backed Gull on 5<sup>th</sup>, 5 Herring Gull on 26<sup>th</sup> and 3 Yellow-legged Gull on 5<sup>th</sup>.

Collared Dove numbered 22 in trees by the Ranger Base on 13<sup>th</sup>. A Barn Owl was flying around Sheepwash Car Park at dusk on 1<sup>st</sup> at the same time as 2 Tawny Owl were contact calling. Kingfisher were seen at many locations and on most days of the month and 2 flew past Sheepwash Hide together on 22<sup>nd</sup>. A Green Woodpecker was in Millfields Car Park on 18<sup>th</sup> and 7 Skylark flew over on 2<sup>nd</sup>. Meadow Pipit were not as numerous this autumn, with a maximum of 15 on 1<sup>st</sup>, but a Water Pipit, heard independently by two observers, could not be located at all. With many Waxwings in Derbyshire this month, 37 feeding on red berries by the path to the Wildlife Centre for half an hour on 18<sup>th</sup> were still very welcome, and another 'tinkling bell' flew over Millfields on 24<sup>th</sup>. There were 30 Blackbirds counted between the Wildlife Centre and Stones Island on 26<sup>th</sup>, including 10 in one tree. Single late or wintering Chiffchaff were recorded, at Millfields on 2<sup>nd</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup>, Wildlife Centre on 13<sup>th</sup> and Paul Stanley Hide on 26<sup>th</sup>. Corvids included a flock of 120 Jackdaw at dawn on 18<sup>th</sup>, 11 Rooks on the dam fields on 8<sup>th</sup>, the tame Rook around the Visitor Centre all month and 6 Raven in the air over Blackwall Plantation on 27<sup>th</sup>. Tree Sparrow were seen daily on Sheepwash Car Park feeder and there were 30 on the Wildlife feeders on 22<sup>nd</sup> together with 25 Chaffinch. Single Brambling were noted on 5<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>. There were 100 Siskin on 17<sup>th</sup>, 20 Lesser Redpoll on 16<sup>th</sup>, 10 Bullfinch on 30<sup>th</sup> and 5 Reed Bunting together on 18<sup>th</sup>.

95 species recorded compared with 99 in November 2011, 95 in 2010, 105 in 2009 and 94 in 2008.

### CARSINGTON BIRD CLUB REPORT DECEMBER 2012

#### December Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Slavonian Grebe, Jack Snipe and Waxwing.

December found only 85 species, but added 1 species to the year total, taking the 2012 provisional tally to 159 species, which is a little below average for the past ten years. Water levels have risen from 87% to 92% full during the past month, reflecting the excessive rainfall in December, although STW may well have been pumping in from the River Derwent. The adult Great Northern Diver, which arrived in November, stayed all month and a juvenile, which also appeared briefly last month, continued to be recorded occasionally (2<sup>nd</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup>, 26<sup>th</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup>) and will be assumed to have been present all month. It was still present on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2013. The adult Slavonian Grebe, found in November, remained until 19<sup>th</sup>, mainly seen from Wildlife Centre, but it did travel to Paul Stanley Hide and Fishtail Creek. Maximum wildfowl numbers were from the WeBS count on 16<sup>th</sup> unless dated otherwise: 1 Little Grebe, 44 Great Crested Grebe, 18 Cormorant on 4<sup>th</sup>, 16 Mute Swan, 1 Pink-footed Goose with Canadas 1-9<sup>th</sup> and 65 flew over west on 11<sup>th</sup>, 49 Greylag Goose in flight on 18<sup>th</sup>, 121 Canada Geese on 4<sup>th</sup>, 26 feral Barnacle Geese on 1<sup>st</sup>, 3 Shelduck on 1<sup>st</sup>, 49 Wigeon on 4<sup>th</sup>, 5 Gadwall, 115 Teal on 6<sup>th</sup>, 167 Mallard on 6<sup>th</sup>, 4 Shoveler on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 192 Pochard, 220 Tufted Duck, 21 Goldeneye, 3 Goosander on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 784 Coot.

The only notable raptor records were of a male Sparrowhawk taking a Dunnock from the Wildlife Centre feeders on 14<sup>th</sup> and a Pied Wagtail from Sheepwash shore on 18<sup>th</sup>. Waders included a Golden Plover flying over on 8<sup>th</sup>, 142 Lapwing on 16<sup>th</sup>, 1 Dunlin on 2-9<sup>th</sup>, a site rare Jack Snipe 'bobbing' in reedy area to left of Sheepwash Hide on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 14 Snipe at Wildlife Centre on 31<sup>st</sup>, a Curlew over on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2 Redshank all month, with 3 on 31<sup>st</sup>. The gull roost held 720 Common Gull on 24<sup>th</sup>, at least 10 Herring Gulls on 30<sup>th</sup>, an adult Caspian Gull on 30<sup>th</sup>, 2 Yellow-legged Gull on 24<sup>th</sup> and 4 Great Black-backed Gull on 30<sup>th</sup>.

Tawny Owls were reported at several locations after dusk and Kingfisher was seen most days, with 2 at Sheepwash on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2 at Paul Stanley Hide on 24<sup>th</sup>. The only Meadow Pipit records were 1 on 4<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> with no winter flocks of this species nor of Pied Wagtails and Linnets like last winter. There were 4 Waxwing briefly on Stones Island on 9<sup>th</sup> and a Chiffchaff was seen on 4<sup>th</sup>. A flock of Corvids over Sheepwash at dawn on 6<sup>th</sup> contained 150 Jackdaw and 40 Carrion Crow. The tame Rook, which had become a familiar sight around the Visitor Centre, was sadly found dead in the car park on 24<sup>th</sup>. It had no apparent physical damage to suggest being hit/run-over and was reported as recently getting lethargic. 5 Raven were noted in the air on 1<sup>st</sup>. Tree Sparrows, Chaffinch, Bullfinch and Reed Bunting can be regularly seen on the feeders at the Wildlife Centre, Lane End and Sheepwash Car Park and 20 Tree Sparrow plus 15 Chaffinch were around the Wildlife Centre feeders on 14<sup>th</sup>. A Goldfinch flock, seen around Sheepwash Spit area, held over 20 birds on 7<sup>th</sup> and Siskin numbered 25 between Sheepwash and Lane End on 9<sup>th</sup>.
