## **CARSINGTON MONTHLY BIRD REPORT - FEBRUARY**

## February Highlights: Great Northern Diver, Whooper Swan, Mediterranean and Little Gull.

More snow, occasional fog, 80% ice covered on 19<sup>th</sup> and then sunshine on 27/28<sup>th</sup> and the birds were singing. Water levels were fairly constant at 95% full but the water surface seemed bare as most of the wintering wildfowl had moved on as usual in February. The 3 Great Northern Divers were still around from January until 2<sup>nd</sup> when 4 birds were seen at one time, 1 adult plus 3 juveniles. All 4 were also seen on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> so it is reasonable to assume 4 from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup>. Significant water bird counts included 59 Great Crested Grebe on 19<sup>th</sup>, 57 of which were together on an ice free patch, 15 Cormorant on 12<sup>th</sup>, 2 Whooper Swan on 7<sup>th</sup> and on 20<sup>th</sup>, 150 Pink-footed Geese flying northwest on 28<sup>th</sup>, 26 Barnacle Geese on 28<sup>th</sup>, 2 Egyptian Geese on 5<sup>th</sup>, 4 Shelduck on 20<sup>th</sup>, 23 Wigeon on 17<sup>th</sup>, 60 Teal and 83 Mallard on the WeBS count on 9<sup>th</sup>, a pair of Pintail on 20<sup>th</sup>, 4 Red-crested Pochard on 1<sup>st</sup>, 22 Pochard on 17<sup>th</sup>, 152 Tufted Duck on 15<sup>th</sup>, 18 Goldeneye on 9<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>, 1 Goosander on 9<sup>th</sup> and 464 Coot on 15<sup>th</sup>.

There was very little Raptor activity: single Kestrel and Sparrowhawk regularly, 2 Sparrowhawk on 15<sup>th</sup>, 6 Common Buzzard in the air on 15<sup>th</sup> and a male Peregrine on 6<sup>th</sup>. There were also very few Waders. Oystercatchers had been returning to claim their breeding islands, and they totalled 7 by 15<sup>th</sup>, including the male wearing a bar-code leg ring returning for his eighth breeding season, originally being ringed on the Exe Estuary in Devon. The maximum Lapwing count was 165 on 28<sup>th</sup>. There was a Dunlin on 20<sup>th</sup>, 6 Snipe at the Wildlife Centre on 28<sup>th</sup> and a Woodcock on 8<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>. Curlew passage started with 2 on 9<sup>th</sup> but very few followed and there were 4 Redshank on 9<sup>th</sup>.

An adult Mediterranean Gull was around the gull roost on several days from 9<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup>. The first winter Little Gull found on 27<sup>th</sup> Jan was still present on 1<sup>st</sup> Feb and was last seen on 9<sup>th</sup>, a long stay of 2 weeks. The gull roost held at least 4000 Black-headed Gulls on 28<sup>th</sup>, at least 800 Common Gulls on 12<sup>th</sup>, 35 Lesser Black-backed Gulls on 9<sup>th</sup>, 16 Herring Gulls on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2 Yellow-legged Gulls from 1<sup>st</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> and 4 Great Black-backed Gulls on 3<sup>rd</sup>.

There were 80 Woodpigeon together in trees near Hays Lane on 24<sup>th</sup> and a Kingfisher was seen at Sheepwash on 7<sup>th</sup> and at several other locations later in the month. A few Skylark were flying over on 1<sup>st</sup> but a more significant movement occurred on 15<sup>th</sup> when small groups, totalling 24 birds, were counted flying north during the morning. Two species that were not recorded last month were a Grey Wagtail in Brown Ale Bay on 15<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> and 2 Goldcrest singing in Hall Wood in the sunshine on 28<sup>th</sup>. Five Fieldfare were feeding in Sheepwash car park on 1<sup>st</sup>, 40 Redwing flew over on 26<sup>th</sup> and a pair of Mistle Thrush were around Sheepwash all month. Feeders were popular, with 9 Long-tailed Tit on Paul Stanley feeder on 10<sup>th</sup>, 2 Willow Tit on Wildlife Centre feeder on 24<sup>th</sup>, 24 Tree Sparrow crowded onto Sheepwash car park feeder on 24<sup>th</sup> and 5 Reed Bunting were on Paul Stanley feeder on 6<sup>th</sup>. The local pair of Raven was active and very vocal on many days and a Brambling flew over Sheepwash on 15<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>.
