### Ogston SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) Restoration Project

Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) are important as they support plants and animals that find it difficult to survive elsewhere in the countryside, and they represent the country's best wildlife and geological sites. SSSI are legally protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.

The Ogston Site has held SSSI status for some while and the Club has responsibility to keep it this way.

We are in the process of submitting a plan for restoring and regenerating the habitat for approval by Natural England and Severn Trent. It is proposed to restore the area and scrapes in front of the Clubs main hide and build a new scrape and reedbed in front of the Sue Worsey Hide, we also propose to restore the wet grassland north of the Hide. This will enable us to have more control of water levels for the scrapes. The area of scrub between the public hide and the bird club hide should be cut and cleared in accordance with SSSI management plan. This will enable the regeneration of the wildflowers and grassland habitat. Some scrub clearance work has already been carried out around the hides, scrapes and on the island and, weather and water levels permitting, this will continue over the next few months.

### **Obituary**

#### **JOHN TAGG**

It is with deep regret that I have to inform our members of the passing of John, on November 16th.

John was a member of Ogston Bird Club for many years. He did not renew his membership after 2010. Many long standing members will remember John and his many years of membership of the club. He was a keen photographer and decided to pursue other subjects. "I never go back" he said. John has bequeathed items of photographic equipment to the club.

John along with Maggie Campbell and Ian Macdermott had become close photography buddies. They became known as "Mac,Mag, and Tagg"

He had a good head for remembering dates I am told, but not good at remembering routes and places. On arrival at a destination he would say "how the place had changed"

On a personal note one of the very first people I met at Ogston was John, I will always remember how helpful he was to me. I recall John sat in his usual seat in the hide as so many will do with his two flasks of tea, "I have a dry mouth" he would say.

Our sympathies go to John's brother Carl and sister-in-law.

Since the last newsletter the main activity at the reserve has been routine maintenance work. The most noticeable changes were the opening up of the area at the bottom of the track to the bridge to allow more light to reach the base of the hedges, which are looking a bit 'leggy', and the removal of a large proportion of the taller woody vegetation from around the Hide Pond to encourage fresh growth of the shorter herbs favoured by the Water Voles. The autumn cut of the hay meadow was completed and additional Yellow Rattle seeds spread in the area.

In the nascent woodland area alongside the top pond, a few Wych Elm saplings have been added to the existing young oaks, birch, hawthorns and holly. At the same time the opportunity was taken to cut the rough grass between the young trees - the first time this has been done since the club acquired the land. It is not intended that the grass is cut in this area frequently, but will be included in a set of small areas which will be cut in rotation to provide more variety and help control the spread of nettles and creeping thistle.

Members who do not receive emails about the Work Parties at the reserve will have missed the following: "... the establishment of a large 'insect hotel' or 'wildlife stack' on the reserve would be an asset. This could be a good standalone project for one or two club members to champion, with the only stipulations being that it should not require submission of a planning application to the local council, should use 100% recycled materials and should require close to zero maintenance. Everything else is open to discussion and imagination ...". So far there have been no takers, though a useful pallet to build on did appear overnight, and this is the last call for a volunteer. # **Monthly Highlights**

August 2014 Species recorded = 102

Running Total = 153

August continued hot until the arrival of ex-hurricane Bertha on 10th, after which the weather became a bit more unsettled, with more frequent rainfall and the reservoir remained full throughout, though it was still quite warm at times. Wildfowl of interest included a few juvenile Shelducks, a Barnacle Goose, a few records of Gadwall and Shoveler, and a Common Scoter flew through on 25th. Little Egrets made an appearance on two dates and a Marsh Harrier passed through on 25th. A quite early Water Rail arrived on 24th which will presumably remain for the winter, The high water levels were not favourable for waders, though a few passed through or paused briefly including a Whimbrel, two Green Sandpipers, a few Greenshank and best of all a Spotted Redshank which flew through on 10th, a rare visitor in recent times. A juvenile Mediterranean Gull stayed for about half an hour on 16th and the regular Yellow-legged Gull remained throughout the month. The Common Tern families gradually moved on and sightings became intermittent towards the end of the month. Sightings of Little Owl were still quite frequent early in the month. Swifts were moving south on many dates though a few were still around at the end of the month and there was a slight increase in sightings of Green Woodpecker, which are perhaps finally showing some signs of recovering from the recent harsh winters. Hirundines were present in reasonable numbers especially Sand Martins which were often present in higher than average numbers for this time of year. A Wood Warbler was an excellent autumn sighting and most other warblers were present in reasonable numbers, including higher numbers of Lesser Whitethroats than in recent autumns. There were three sightings of Redstarts, a Whinchat on was present on 17th, and a Wheatear was seen on 12th. A couple of Yellow Wagtails flew through towards the end of the month and Meadow pipits began moving through in small numbers. A reasonable flock of up to 60

Goldfinch built up but there are very few Linnets around so far (none appear to have bred this year due to their favoured sites becoming overgrown due to the lack of site maintenance).

**Barnacle Goose** A feral bird was present with Canada Geese on 20th.

**Canada Goose** The maximum count was of 193 on 10th.

**Common Gull** One on 19th and one on 25th.

**Common Sandpiper** Singles present on 10th, 11th, 13th, 15th, 16th, 18th and 21st.

**Common Scoter** A drake flew SSW at 12:07 hrs on 26th.

**Common Tern** Present daily during the first half of the month, but after both family parties moved on sightings

became much more erratic.

**Gadwall** Three on 5th and one on 25th were the only records.

Garden Warbler Last recorded on 17th.

Green Sandpiper Two present on the West Bank on 28th.
Green Woodpecker Singles on 12th, 15th, 16th and 23rd.

Greenshank 3 flew through without landing at 13:10 hrs on 7th, one was heard at 19:15 hrs on 14th and

presumably the same one was heard but not seen early morning on 15th.

**Greylag Goose** The maximum count was of 82 on 14th, a new record count for Ogston.

**Hobby** Fairly regular sightings of 1-2 birds this month, but most sightings were first-summer birds.

**House Martin** Counts of c80 on 13th and 14th and at least 600 flew through on 30th.

Lesser Whitethroat Singles on 7th and 11th, 2 on 13th, 1 on 15th/16th, 2 on 17th, 1 on 23rd, 3 on 30th and 2 on 31st.

Little Egret One Flew in at 16:00 hrs on 19th and two arrived at 11:30 hrs on 20th.

**Little Owl** Seen quite regularly during the early part of the month.

Mandarin Small numbers recorded quite regularly with a maximum count of 13 on 8th.

Marsh Harrier One present at 14:45hrs on 26th.

Mediterranean Gull A juvenile was present 08:40 – 09:10 hrs on 16th.

**Mute Swan** The regular pair were present until 6<sup>th</sup>, then replaced by 3 immature birds.

Peregrine Singles on 3rd, 8th and 31st.

**Raven** Reported intermittently throughout the month with a maximum of six on 30th.

**Redshank** One present on 9th.

**Redstart** A juv/fem on 23rd, a male on 25th and a juv/fem on 27th.

Reed Warbler Recorded throughout the month, one pair with recently fledged young on 15th were presumably a

second brood.

Sand Martin Reported in larger numbers than normal for this time of year with up to 50 present some days.

Shelduck Three juveniles present early morning on 10th and another juvenile present briefly on 13th.

**Shoveler** Three on 3rd and one on 14th.

**Snipe** The only sightings were of three on 4th, three on 10th and one on 19th.

**Spotted Flycatcher** Present regularly at Brackenfield Church, otherwise reported from the West Bank with singles on 17th

and 30th and one at Carr Pond 19th.

**Spotted Redshank** One flew SW at 08:42 hrs on 10th, a very scarce visitor nowadays.

Swift Present throughout the month, counts included 60+ on 3rd, c120 which flew S on 9th, c60 on 13th, c15

on14th, 100+ on 16th, 30 on 17th and 24 through on 30th with one on 31st.

Teal Small numbers present daily with a maximum count of 12 on 30th.

Water Rail One first seen on 24th was present to the month end.

Wheatear One present briefly on 12th.

Whimbrel One flew around several times unable to find anywhere to land during the evening of 8th.

Whinchat One on the West Bank on 17th.

Wood Warbler One on 18th, a very scarce visitor here.

Yellow Wagtail Singles flew through on 25th and 30th.

Yellow-legged Gull The regular 4thS/adult remained throughout the month.

September was mainly quite warm and dry allowing water levels to drop during the second half of the month. The weather was dominated by high pressure and prolonged but mainly light easterly winds giving rise to murky misty conditions up until 21<sup>st</sup> after which the winds were more frequently from the west though it still remained mainly warm and dry.

The first Pink-feet of the autumn passed through on 28<sup>th</sup>, 82 Greylag Geese on 9<sup>th</sup> equalled the record number set last month and a Snow Goose, presumed to be either an escape or from the feral British population was present on 8<sup>th</sup>. Large numbers of Mandarins were present at times, a few Pintail passed through and other wildfowl of interest included fairly regular Shovelers, the second Red-breasted Merganser of the year and a few Goosanders. Highlight of the month was two Great White Egrets which passed through on 20<sup>th</sup> (two also passed through on 16<sup>th</sup> September 2012.) There were two sightings of Goshawk, presumably both relating to the same individual and a Merlin flew through on 29<sup>th</sup>. The Water Rail continued to show well at times early in the month but became more elusive later. A few Golden Plover passed through on 28<sup>th</sup> and the lower water levels attracted a few waders including Ruff, Black-tailed Godwit, Whimbrel and Green Sandpiper. The resident Yellow-legged Gull remained throughout and on some nights quite large numbers of gulls roosted. A Black Tern stayed for over four hours on 6<sup>th</sup>. Little Owls continued to be seen regularly by Brackenfield Church and Jays have been present in higher than normal numbers with some movements detected. Hirundines were heading south on many days, through in mainly small numbers and many warblers seem to have left early. A Dipper was seen on the River Amber on 12<sup>th</sup>. There was a noticeable increase in the numbers of Blackbirds and Song Thrushes from 12<sup>th</sup> onwards while returning migrants included a few Yellow Wagtails and a single Tree Pipit.

Black Tern A juvenile present on 6<sup>th</sup>, from 10:50 – 15:18 hrs when it flew NE.

**Blackbird** A noticeable increase in numbers from 12<sup>th</sup> onwards, presumably continental birds swelling the local

populations.

Black-tailed Godwit At least one was present from 28<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup> but was elusive. Two unidentified waders that flew W at

10:15 hrs on 8th were probably also this species.

Buzzard The maximum count was of 15 on 7<sup>th</sup>.

Canada Goose The maximum count was of c120 on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Chaffinch** At least 50 were in a recently ploughed field by the West Bank on 20<sup>th</sup> and c60 were feeding on beech-

mast at Highoredish on 21st.

**Common Gull** A 1stS from 12<sup>th</sup> – 14<sup>th</sup>, one on 17<sup>th</sup>, an adult on 28th

**Common Sandpiper** One on 1<sup>st</sup>, four flew through N on 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Common Tern** One on 2<sup>nd</sup>.

**Curlew** Three through on 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Dipper One on the River Amber on 12<sup>th</sup>.

Dunlin One flew through at 10:05 hrs on 4<sup>th</sup>.

Gadwall

One on 1<sup>st</sup>, three on 8<sup>th</sup>, one on 27<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup>, four on 29<sup>th</sup> and three on 30<sup>th</sup>.

Golden Plover

Three flew over Highoredish and two flew S over the reservoir on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Goldfinch** A flock around the West Bank car park held c60 on 4<sup>th</sup>.

**Goosander** 3 flew over Highoredish on 27<sup>th</sup>, 2 flew N over the reservoir on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Goshawk** 1 flew W over the reservoir on 6<sup>th</sup> and 1 over Highoredish on 21<sup>st</sup>, being mobbed by a Raven.

**Great Black-backed Gull** Three roosting on 20<sup>th</sup>.

Great White Egret Two arrived from the south at 11:20 hrs, and after flying up and down the West Bank a couple of

times left to the west at 11:28 hrs on 20<sup>th</sup>. The 4th record for Ogston and the second time that two

have been seen together here.

**Green Sandpiper** One flew through at 10:06 hrs on 4<sup>th</sup>.

**Green Woodpecker** One on 27<sup>th</sup>.

**Greylag Goose** The maximum count was of 82 on 9<sup>th</sup>, equalling the new record count for Ogston last month.

Herring Gull
The first of the autumn arrived on 27<sup>th</sup>.

Hobby
The last to be seen was a juvenile on 20<sup>th</sup>.

**House Martin** Highest counts were of c300 on 1<sup>st</sup> and c200 on 8<sup>th</sup>,

**House Sparrow** A flock of c30 were feeding in a newly ploughed stubble field by the West Bank on 5<sup>th</sup>, an unusual

number.

Jay Larger than normal numbers were present with some movements noted including 16 which flew ENE

on 14<sup>th</sup> while at least 18 were present on 21<sup>st</sup>.

**Kingfisher** One – two seen daily throughout the month.

Lesser Black-backed Gull Birds were seen roosting on several nights presumably Carsington bound birds disorientated by the

foggy conditions, the max. count being of c800 present early morning on 19<sup>th</sup>.

**Lesser Whitethroat** Two on 1<sup>st</sup> were the only ones this month.

**Little Owl** One – two were still being seen regularly throughout the month near Brackenfield Church.

Mandarin Large numbers were often present first thing, particularly in Milltown Inlet, the max count being c. 55

on 27<sup>th</sup>.

Meadow Pipit Small numbers passed through on some dates though most seemed to have been held back by

unfavourable conditions, higher numbers passed during the last week but the only count made was of

53 on flying SW on 23<sup>rd</sup>.

**Merlin** One flew through on 29<sup>th</sup>.

Mute Swan The 3 immature birds remained all month. One was attacked and injured by a dog near Ogston Hall on

16<sup>th</sup>.

Peregrine One on 30<sup>th</sup>.

**Pink-footed Goose** A skein of 36 flew W at 08:20 hrs on 28<sup>th</sup>.

Pintail One on 11<sup>th</sup>, four arrived with Wigeon on 19<sup>th</sup>, four on 20<sup>th</sup>, one on 21<sup>st</sup> and one on 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Pochard Two on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Raven** One – four recorded intermittently throughout the month.

Red-breasted Merganser An eclipse or immature drake flew up and down the reservoir then left NE.

**Reed Warbler** A few around early in the month up until 12<sup>th</sup> then one on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Rock Pipit** One flew NW at 10:52 hrs on 28<sup>th</sup> and aseemed to land briefly on the North Bank. 1 flew NW On 29<sup>th</sup> at

10:09 hrs.

Ruff One on 28<sup>th</sup>.

**Sand Martin** Small numbers at the beginning of the month the last one being on 9<sup>th</sup>.

**Sedge Warbler** One on 12<sup>th</sup> appears to have been the last.

**Shoveler** Present fairly regularly throughout the month with a maximum count of seven on 4<sup>th</sup>.

Siskin The first record of the autumn was of one which flew N on 20<sup>th</sup>.

**Linnet** A flock present briefly in newly ploughed fields by the West Bank with a max of 115 on 20<sup>th</sup>.

**Snipe** Present regularly with at least 19 on 29<sup>th</sup> being the highest count.

**Song Thrush** A noticeable increase in numbers from the 12<sup>th</sup> onwards, the highest count was of 14 on 23<sup>rd</sup>.

**Spotted Flycatcher** One on 1<sup>st</sup>.

**Stock Dove** A flock began to build up in stubble fields by the West Bank. The maximum count was of 67 on 13<sup>th</sup>.

Swallow Small numbers moving through on most days, the highest count being of c500 on 8<sup>th</sup>.

Teal Good numbers present after water levels fell with over 50 by the end of the month.

**Tree Pipit** One flew S on 1<sup>st</sup>.

Water Rail One was seen quite regularly early in the month but became more elusive later, with no sightings after

19<sup>th</sup>.

**Whimbrel** One flew S at 11:47 hrs on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Whitethroat** Scarce this month, one on 26<sup>th</sup> was the last.

**Yellow Wagtail** Two flew SW on 3<sup>rd</sup>, one over on 5<sup>th</sup> and one flew SW on 7<sup>th</sup>.

Yellow-legged Gull The regular 4thS/adult remained throughout the month. Two adults roosting on 20<sup>th</sup>.

#### Escapes

**Snow Goose** A blue-phase adult (of unknown origin but presumed escape) was with the mixed goose flock on 8<sup>th</sup>. **Yellow-billed Teal** One on 28<sup>th</sup>.

#### October 2014 Species recorded = 104

Running Total = 161

Overall October was a mainly dry and mild month apart from a few storms including the remnants of Hurricane Gonzalo. Water levels fell as a consequence of the low rainfall. Highlight of the month was a flock of Bearded Tits on 29<sup>th</sup>, the first ever to be seen at Ogston and a record flock for Derbyshire. There were several sightings of Whooper Swans, Pink-footed Geese passed through quite frequently and other wildfowl of interest included Shelduck, a few Pintail, Goldeneye and Goosanders. There were a couple of brief sightings of Little Egrets. A Goshawk was seen quite frequently at Highoredish and three Merlins passed through. Waders included Golden Plovers, a few Dunlin, Jack Snipe, Black-tailed Godwit, Whimbrel and Curlew. A Bonxie, only the third ever at Ogston stayed for a hour and a half on 30<sup>th</sup>. Gulls began roosting in numbers on some nights including a few Yellow-legged Gulls. A late Arctic Tern passed through on 13<sup>th</sup>. Large numbers of Woodpigeons passed through late in the month together with a few Stock Doves. A Ring-necked Parakeet flew SW over Highoredish with Meadow Pipits on 5<sup>th</sup>. A Sand Martin on 9<sup>th</sup> was the latest ever. Redwings arrived in numbers from 11<sup>th</sup> onwards but Fieldfares arrived late. A couple of Stonechats were the first this year. A record count of Meadow Pipits passed over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup> and there were three records of Rock Pipit. What would otherwise have been the highlight of the year, a Pallid Swift was unfortunately seen too distantly.

Mute Swan The three immature birds remained until 29<sup>th</sup> and they were joined by a fourth bird on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup> &

14<sup>th</sup>. On 30<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> just one was present.

**Whooper Swan** Three were present all day on 13<sup>th</sup> and until early morning on 14<sup>th</sup> when they flew off N, a further 12

(11 adults & 1 juv) dropped in briefly at 11:00 hrs then flew N, on 31st ten including three juveniles

were present early morning but flew off NE at 07:33 hrs.

Pink-footed Goose A skein of 125 flew NW at 08:55 hrs on 2<sup>nd</sup>. On 15<sup>th</sup> c200 flew NW at 09:50 hrs and one was down with

the Goose flock which remained on and off until 27<sup>th</sup>. On 16<sup>th</sup> c190 flew E at 12:07 hrs, 43 flew SE at 09:10 on 26<sup>th</sup>. c37 flew SE at 11:10 hrs on 27<sup>th</sup>. On 29<sup>th</sup> c56 flew SE at 09:30 hrs, a further 36 flew SE at

09:35 hrs and c40 flew NW at 13:15 hrs.

**Greylag Goose** The maximum count was of 49 on 5<sup>th</sup>. **Canada Goose** The maximum count was of 42 on 3<sup>rd</sup>.

**Shelduck** Two flew through on 30<sup>th</sup>.

**Mandarin** The maximum count was of ten on 2<sup>nd</sup>.

**Wigeon** Small numbers present most days, the maximum count being of 12 on 4<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>.

**Gadwall** The only records were of one on 5<sup>th</sup> and four on 8<sup>th</sup>.

**Teal** Good numbers often present the maximum count being of 155 on 8<sup>th</sup>. **Pintail** One on 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>. On 30<sup>th</sup> two were present and five flew SW.

Shoveler Three on  $1^{st}$ , four on  $2^{nd}$ , three on  $3^{rd}/4^{th}$ , one on  $5^{th} - 7^{th}$ , three on  $8^{th} - 11^{th}$ , one on  $12^{th}$ , two from

13<sup>th</sup> – 17<sup>th</sup> and two from 24<sup>th</sup> to the end of the month.

**Pochard** Three on 3<sup>rd</sup>, three on 11<sup>th</sup> and two on 31<sup>st</sup>.

**Goldeneye** Single fem/imm on 4<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>. **Goosander** One on 15<sup>th</sup> one on 30<sup>th</sup>.

**Little Egret** On 20<sup>th</sup> one present briefly at 09:40 hrs then flew off S. On 23<sup>rd</sup> two flew S down the reservoir at 08:30

hrs

**Goshawk** A juv male over Highoredish on 19<sup>th</sup>, and then on 28<sup>th</sup> and seen 6 separate times on 29<sup>th</sup>.

Merlin One flew SW over Highoredish at 11:17 hrs on 5<sup>th</sup>, one flew SW at 15:14 hrs on 19<sup>th</sup>, and one flew SW

at 09:40 hrs on 29<sup>th</sup>.

Peregrine One on 2<sup>nd</sup>.

**Golden Plover** Two flew SW over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. **Lapwing** The highest count was of c150 on 1<sup>st</sup>.

**Dunlin** 1 was present briefly on the West Bank until flushed by a Heron on 6<sup>th</sup> and 1 through on 14<sup>th</sup>.

On 30<sup>th</sup> 8 flew through (with an unidentified wader), 3 dropped in later and 1 flew W with four Snipe.

**Jack Snipe** One was flushed on the West Bank by a Severn Trent Ranger on 2<sup>nd</sup>.

**Snipe** Quite good numbers were present all month the highest count being of 26 on 26<sup>th</sup>.

Black-tailed Godwit One on 1<sup>st</sup>, five on 2<sup>nd</sup>

Whimbrel On 30<sup>th</sup> one arrived with a Curlew at 16:05 hrs and landed for a short while on the West Bank then flew

off. The latest ever record at Ogston.

**Curlew** One arrived with the Whimbrel above on 30<sup>th</sup> but appeared not to land.

**Great Skua** On 30<sup>th</sup> an adult arrived at 08:05 hrs and stayed until 09:25 hrs. When it wasn't flying up and down the

reservoir chasing gulls, it landed on the water briefly several times. The third ever at Ogston.

**Common Gull**Recorded fairly regularly the maximum count being of 15 in the roost on 22<sup>nd</sup>. **Lesser Black-backed Gull** 85 flew NE on 2<sup>nd</sup>, c300 in the roost on 22<sup>nd</sup>, and c200 in the roost on 28<sup>th</sup>.

Herring Gull A few in gradually increasing numbers, the highest count being of 12 flying over Highoredish on 27<sup>th</sup>.

Yellow-legged Gull The regular 4thS/adult remained until at least 28<sup>th</sup>, also a 1stW on 6<sup>th</sup>, a 1stW on 9<sup>th</sup>, six in the roost (4

adults & 2 1stW) on 22nd, 2 passed through (adult & 2ndW) and one in a pre-roost gathering on 30<sup>th</sup>.

Great Black-backed Gull A few birds starting to appear in increasing numbers as the month progressed, the maximum count

was of 15 roosting on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

**Arctic Tern** A late juvenile flew through at 11:07 hrs on 13<sup>th</sup>.

**Stock Dove** A few passing over with Woodpigeons, the highest count being of 40 on 31<sup>st</sup>.

**Woodpigeon** Good numbers passing through on several days, the highest count being of 7625 on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Ring-necked Parakeet** One flew SW over Highoredish at 08:27 hrs on 5<sup>th</sup>, about the sixth ever at Ogston.

**Little Owl** Still being seen occasionally near Brackenfield Church at the beginning of the month.

Swift On 18<sup>th</sup> a Swift believed to be a Pallid Swift was seen distantly at Highoredish between 09:40 and 09:48

hrs. It did appear to be quite pale at times with a different structure/jizz to Common Swift but unfortunately was only seen at very long range, too far to obtain the level of detail required for an

acceptable record.

Kingfisher One – three seen most days, mainly at Milltown Inlet or Carr Pond, occasionally visiting the areas by

the hides.

**Green Woodpecker** One at Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>.

**Raven** One –two seen quite regularly throughout the month.

**Bearded Tit** On 29<sup>th</sup> a flock of at least 12 flew in, arriving from the NE at approx 11:00hrs and landed in the reedbed

N of the Members Hide. After a few minutes they flew off SW. The first record for Ogston and a

record count for Derbyshire.

**Skylark** Seen regularly passing over especially at Highoredish where 55 passed over on 2<sup>nd</sup>, c30 over on 26<sup>th</sup>,

c30 over and c70 circling nearby fields (just outside the recording area) on 29<sup>th</sup>.

**Sand Martin** One flew S on 9<sup>th</sup>, the latest ever at Ogston.

**Swallow** Reasonable numbers present during the first week, the highest count was of 33 over Highoredish on

11<sup>th</sup>. The last to be recorded were two which flew S on 12<sup>th</sup>.

Small numbers were seen most days early in the month, the maximum count being of at least 72 flying **House Martin** 

S at Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. The last to be seen was one which flew SW on 19<sup>th</sup>.

A few still around early in the month up until 8<sup>th</sup> then none until a female on 30<sup>th</sup>. Blackcap

Still in good numbers at the start of the month, but gradually declining until the last one seen on 24<sup>th</sup>. Chiffchaff The first to arrive was one at Highoredish on 29<sup>th</sup>. At least 100 passed through on 30<sup>th</sup> and 444 flew **Fieldfare** 

SW on 31<sup>st</sup>.

Five over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup> were the first of the autumn, after which seen regularly with a highest Redwing

counts of 1000+ over Highoredish on 17<sup>th</sup> and 2760 over on 31<sup>st</sup>.

A fem/imm by the West Bank car park from 4<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup>, again at Highoredish on 5<sup>th</sup>. Stonechat

At Highoredish one flew N on 11<sup>th</sup>, three N on 20<sup>th</sup>, and one W on 28<sup>th</sup>. **Tree Sparrow** 

A roost began building up with a maximum count of c50 on 22<sup>nd</sup>. Good numbers of alba **Pied Wagtail** 

(Pied or White) Wagtails numbers passed through with 189 over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>.

A total of 613 flew SW over Highoredish in three hours on 5<sup>th</sup>. A total of 1077 flew SW on 11<sup>th</sup> **Meadow Pipit** 

between 08:00 and 12:00 hrs, the vast majority passing in the first two and a half hours, a new record

count for Ogston.

One present on 1<sup>st</sup>, one on 12<sup>th</sup>, and one flew NW at 11:09 hrs on 14<sup>th</sup>. **Rock Pipit** 

Quite good numbers were recorded passing over Highoredish. At least 53 flew SW on 5<sup>th</sup>, at least 80 Chaffinch

passed over on 11<sup>th</sup> and at least 131 passed over on 28<sup>th</sup>.

The first of the autumn were three over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. Most other records were of birds passing **Brambling** 

over there with a maximum count of 42 on 28<sup>th</sup>.

The highest count was of 43 which flew SW over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. Goldfinch

The highest count was of 34 over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. Siskin The highest count was of 147 over Highoredish on 11<sup>th</sup>. Linnet

**Escapes** 

The bird from September present up until at least 29<sup>th</sup>, though could be elusive at times. Yellow-billed Teal

#### **November 2014** Species recorded = 90 Running Total = 162

Winds were mainly light and variable during November and fog and mist frequently hampered viewing. There were a few frosts but overall it was generally a quite mild month. There was a fair amount of rain at times particularly early in the month which raised water levels somewhat, though the reservoir remained well below full.

Nine Whooper Swans arrived on the last day of the month and good numbers of Pink-footed Geese passed over, including a new record count on 5<sup>th</sup>. Otherwise it was a fairly quiet month for wildfowl, Teal and Mallard were present in good numbers while water levels were low early in the month but numbers fell as water levels began to rise. Otherwise of most interest was a Pintail that was present on several dates. Goshawk continued to be seen at Highoredish at the beginning of the month. There was just a single sighting of Water Rail. The relatively low water levels attracted a few scarce waders including a Knot, a Ruff and a Jack Snipe. The gull roost often held large numbers of birds and included a few Yellow-legged and Caspian Gulls. There was just one record of Little Owl this month. A good number of winter thrushes passed over Highoredish at the beginning of the month and a few roaming flocks remained in the area. A few Bramblings passed over Highoredish at the beginning of the month, but only one was seen down by the reservoir.

Roost counts were of 2000+ on  $9^{th}$ , 5000+ on  $21^{st}$  and 6000+ on  $23^{rd}$ . **Black-headed Gull** 

Birds passing over Highoredish were one on  $4^{th}$ , two on  $2^{nd}$ , one on  $4^{th}$  and three on  $9^{th}$ . Elsewhere the **Brambling** 

only record was of one which flew over the West Bank car park on 29<sup>th</sup>.

An adult in the roost on 9<sup>th</sup>, a 2ndW in the roost on 24<sup>th</sup> and a 1stW in the roost on 30<sup>th</sup>. **Caspian Gull** At Highoredish 23 flew over on 4<sup>th</sup> and up to 50 regularly feeding on beech-mast there. Chaffinch

At Highoredish 43 flew SW on 1<sup>st</sup>, 127 flew SW on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 392 flew SW on 8<sup>th</sup> and 268 flew SW on 9<sup>th</sup>. **Fieldfare** 

Otherwise just small numbers feeding around the site.

One on 5<sup>th</sup> and two on 29<sup>th</sup> were the only ones this month. Gadwall

One on 3<sup>rd</sup>, five on 7<sup>th</sup>, one on 10<sup>th</sup>, one on 11<sup>th</sup>, one on 19<sup>th</sup>, one on 21<sup>st</sup>, two drakes on 22<sup>nd</sup>, two fem/imm on 23<sup>rd</sup>, one drake on 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>, one on 29<sup>th</sup> and three on 30<sup>th</sup>. Goldeneve

One on 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup>, three redheads on 5<sup>th</sup>, seven briefly early morning on 7<sup>th</sup>, two flew through Goosander

on 23<sup>rd</sup>, one on 25<sup>th</sup> and one redhead on 30<sup>th</sup>.

At Highoredish one on  $2^{nd}$ , two on  $5^{th}$  and one on  $9^{th}$ . Goshawk c250 in the roost on 9<sup>th</sup>, 500+ in the roost on 30<sup>th</sup>. Great Black-backed Gull

The maximum count was of 32 on 24<sup>th</sup>. **Greylag Goose** 

62 flew SW on 2<sup>nd</sup>, c350 in the roost on 9<sup>th</sup>, 500+ in the roost on 23<sup>rd</sup>. **Herring Gull** 

Kingfisher One – three were seen on most days.

**Lesser Black-backed Gull** c550 were in the roost on 9<sup>th</sup> but numbers were much smaller by the month's end with c40 on 30<sup>th</sup>.

A small number around the highest count being of 11 on 4<sup>th</sup>. Lesser Redpoll

Little Owl One calling at dusk by Carr Wood on 22<sup>nd</sup>. The maximum count was of 132 on 3<sup>rd</sup>. Mallard

One on  $2^{nd}$  and one on  $9^{th}$  were the only records this month. One on  $3^{rd}$  and  $4^{th}$  was the only one this month. Mandarin

Peregrine

A total of 2370 in 19 skeins flew SE on 5<sup>th</sup>, a new record count for Ogston, 18 flew SE on 17<sup>th</sup>, C70 flew **Pink-footed Goose** 

SE at 11:36 hrs on 23<sup>rd</sup> and 33 flew E at 10:30 hrs on 24<sup>th</sup>.

One female/imm was present on 19<sup>th</sup>, 21<sup>st</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. **Pintail** 

1 on  $2^{nd}$ , four on  $6^{th}$ , one on  $10^{th}$ , one on  $14^{th}$ , one on  $15^{th}$ , one on  $18^{th}$ , two on  $20^{th}$ , one on  $25^{th}$  and **Pochard** 

three on 26<sup>th</sup>,

Maximum count of four on 30<sup>th</sup>. Raven

At Highoredish 693 flew SW on 1<sup>st</sup>, 143 flew SW on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 216 flew SW on 8<sup>th</sup>, 275 flew SW on 9<sup>th</sup>. Redwing

Two on 1<sup>st</sup> was the only record this month. Shoveler

The maximum count was of 15 on 2<sup>nd</sup> over Highoredish. Siskin At Highoredish 47 over on 4<sup>th</sup> and 19 over on 8<sup>th</sup>, Skylark

Snipe Up to around 35 were present at times but difficult to get accurate counts.

A total of 92 flew SW over Highoredish on 1<sup>st</sup> and up to 200 were roosting in reeds by the hides on Starling

The highest counts were of 97 on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 122 on 3<sup>rd</sup>, but numbers fell as water levels rose. Teal

Three in gardens behind the Dam on 29<sup>th</sup>. **Tree Sparrow** 

Maximum count of c20 on 17<sup>th</sup>. **Tufted Duck** One was seen near the hides on 7<sup>th</sup>. **Water Rail** 

One flew over calling above low cloud on 10<sup>th</sup> and one on 28<sup>th</sup>. **Golden Plover** 

The maximum count was of 409 on 22<sup>nd</sup>. Lapwing

One in winter plumage on the West Bank on 11<sup>th</sup>. Knot One on the West Bank early morning on 29<sup>th</sup>. **Dunlin** 

Ruff One present briefly with Lapwings during the evening of 29<sup>th</sup>.

One on 25<sup>th</sup>. Jack Snipe

On 30<sup>th</sup> six (four adults and 2 juveniles) arrived at around 10:20 hrs and these were joined by another Whooper Swan

three adults at 10:46 hrs.

Wigeon Present fairly regularly with a maximum of eight on 6<sup>th</sup>.

One flew out of Carr Wood at dusk on 22<sup>nd</sup>. Woodcock

1533 flew W/SW over Highoredish on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2044 over there on 4<sup>th</sup>. Woodpigeon

The regular adult was last present on 4<sup>th</sup>, one adult on 21<sup>st</sup>, an adult in the roost on 22<sup>nd</sup> 24<sup>th</sup>, one Yellow-legged Gull

adult on 26<sup>th</sup> and three (two adults and a 1stW) in the roost on 30<sup>th</sup>.

Yellow-billed Teal Seen again on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, and 19<sup>th</sup>. **Escapes**
