## **OCTOBER 2017 BIRD NOTES**

Highlights: Great White Egret, Brent Goose, Green-winged Teal, Scaup, Merlin, Little Stint, Kittiwake, Water Pipit, Yellow-browed Warbler, Crossbill and Hawfinch.

Water levels remained low but there were some excellent birds to be seen and some impressive counts, including the best for Gadwall and Teal in a decade, the most Pintail since 1992 and site record highs for Shoveler, Wood Pigeon and Hawfinch. Water bird counts this month are from the WeBS count on 14<sup>th</sup> unless stated: 31 Little Grebe, 29 Great Crested Grebe on 4<sup>th</sup>, 12 Cormorant on 17<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>, 10 Little Egret on 4<sup>th</sup>, a Great White Egret, at Sheepwash, on 16<sup>th</sup>, 3 Grey Heron, 47 Mute Swan on 4<sup>th</sup>, 130 Pink-footed Geese on 30<sup>th</sup>, 401 Greylag Geese on 31<sup>st</sup>, 1,050 Canada Geese, 29 Barnacle Geese on 17<sup>th</sup>, a Brent Goose on 8<sup>th</sup>, 3 Shelduck on 31<sup>st</sup>, single Mandarin on 15<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, 385 Wigeon on 11<sup>th</sup>, 86 Gadwall, a drake Green-winged Teal from 1<sup>st</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> at least, 522 Teal on 4<sup>th</sup>, 156 Mallard, 23 Pintail on 4<sup>th</sup>, 17 Shoveler on 4<sup>th</sup>, 3 Red-crested Pochard on 4<sup>th</sup>, 167 Pochard on 20<sup>th</sup>, 336 Tufted Duck, 2 Scaup on 6<sup>th</sup>, 2 Common Scoter on 18<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup>, 4 Goldeneye on 21<sup>st</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>, 4 Goosander on 24<sup>th</sup>, a Water Rail in the Hopton reed bed from 15<sup>th</sup> to the month end, 5 Moorhen and 1,141 Coot.

Raptor records were: 2 Sparrowhawk on 6<sup>th</sup>, 7 Buzzard the same day, 3 Kestrel on 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>, a Merlin which flew south down the east side on 17<sup>th</sup> and 4 reports of Peregrine.

Waders maximum counts were represented by: 16 Ringed Plover on 12<sup>th</sup>, a Golden Plover on 15<sup>th</sup>, 213 Lapwing on 14<sup>th</sup>, a Little Stint on 4<sup>th</sup>, 8 Dunlin on several dates, 4 Ruff from 27<sup>th</sup> to the month end, 10 Snipe on 19<sup>th</sup>, 2 Black-tailed Godwit on 27<sup>th</sup>, 1 Curlew on 18<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, 5 Redshank on 30<sup>th</sup>, a Greenshank on 6<sup>th</sup> and a Common Sandpiper on 29<sup>th</sup>.

Very few Gull records this month: 40 Common Gull on 30<sup>th</sup>, 2 Herring Gull on 20<sup>th</sup>, 7 Yellow-legged Gull on 9<sup>th</sup>, 3 Great Black-backed Gull on 13<sup>th</sup> and 2 adult Kittiwake on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

A massive 11,400 Wood Pigeon flew south on 18<sup>th</sup>, 8 Skylark on 25<sup>th</sup>, 80 Meadow Pipit on 18<sup>th</sup>, a site rare Water Pipit was seen briefly on 17<sup>th</sup> and there were 4 reports of Rock Pipit between 1<sup>st</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>. A Grey Wagtail roost formed, again, in the Hopton reed bed and 11 left there at dawn on 29<sup>th</sup>, 2 late Wheatear were last seen on the dam wall on 22<sup>nd</sup>, 80 Fieldfare flew over on 28<sup>th</sup>, as did 500 Redwing on 15<sup>th</sup> and 2 Blackcap were on Stones Island on 25<sup>th</sup>. A Yellow-browed Warbler was heard calling near the Ranger Base on 16<sup>th</sup> but unfortunately it could not be seen, this will be the 3<sup>rd</sup> record in successive years subject to acceptance by the DOS rarity committee. Lingering Chiffchaff included 3 on 6<sup>th</sup> and 1 still on 31<sup>st</sup>, 7 Raven flew over on 21<sup>st</sup>, 685 Starling moved southwest on 16<sup>th</sup>, 17 Tree Sparrow were counted on 12<sup>th</sup> and 13 Brambling on 15<sup>th</sup>. Other Finch counts included 40 Siskin on 15<sup>th</sup>, 50 Linnet on 5<sup>th</sup>, 13 Lesser Redpoll on 31<sup>st</sup> and 11 Crossbill on 29<sup>th</sup>. During the second half of the month it became clear that a huge irruption of Hawfinch was taking place across the south of the UK and Carsington did not miss out; 4 were seen flying southwest on 21<sup>st</sup> and then an incredible 26, including a group of 15, were recorded on 28<sup>th</sup>. Finally 25 Reed Bunting left their roost at the Hopton end on 15<sup>th</sup>.

108 species recorded this October compared with 108 in 2016, 96 in 2015, 98 in 2014 and 103 in 2013.
